

Quotes from Alton... A crossroads Past Present Future. 1883-1983.

The beginning of the settlement of East Orange dates back to the year 1870. Early in that year eighteen 'prairie schooners' left Jackson County, Iowa, to cross the plains and sloughs of the Hawkeye state and established new homes in the 'wild west.' May 20th Sioux County was reached. The Hollanders who came to Sioux County at that time crossed the river and settled around Orange City. In 1872 the Sioux City and St. Paul railroad laid their tracks between leMars and Sheldon and since Orange City was better than two miles from the track they built a depot here and called it East Orange Station. Building a town here was not the original intent. The station needed an agent to handle the freight and to send and receive telegrams, and to accommodate him the company built a little cottage, which like the station was painted or range. One of the surveyors who laid out the right-of-way for the railroad from St. James, Minnesota, to leMars, Ia., Alexander Beach, was offered the position of station manager at East Orange.

The Burket, Wormhoudt lumberyard was the next structure put up so lumber could be unloaded from the cars here rather than haul it from leMars with team and wagon. Next a house for the lumberman was built. Dirk Gleysteen, a carpenter from Pella, worked in this lumberyard, which he later purchased. He came to Sioux County in 1871 upon the request of Henry Hospers to build a house and store in Orange City. It was little more than a speck on the railroad company's map when a second baby was born to Alex and Jennie Beach. On November 22, 1872, Wilfred Warren Beach was the first white child born at the East Orange Station.

During the spring of 1873 H. De Kraay erected a hotel. Early in that same year Peter Kilburg erected a saloon building, but in the fall quit the business and went back east to escape the winter blizzards. After some difficulty, a post office was established early in 1874 in W.R. Plumbe's Store. In the spring of 1875, railroad officials had surveyors plot a townsite al East Orange Station since it was clear that those already there and those contemplating coming, wanted it. H.C. Randall, civil engineer measured out 10 full city blocks and 5 half blocks, and drew up a map of the town which was duly recorded on June 9, 1875.

Early in 1881 the people desired to incorporate the village and change its name to something simpler than East Orange. A meeting was finally held in the post office when Dr. Owens, looking over a postal guide, remarked that there was no Alton in Iowa. This name was agreed to and the newly incorporated town was so called.

After traveling to Orange Cily for seven years to attend the Reformed Church there, the Hollanders of East Orange felt it was time to establish a church in their community. The first preaching service was conducted by Rev. S. Bolks of Orange City on Friday afternoon in the middle of March, 1877, in the school house. The Dutch records show that on March 29, 1879, the church had sixty families, 77 members, 140 catechumans and 115 Sunday School scholars. In 1936 the afternoon service which had previously been conducted in Dutch was changed to the English language. Three years later, both services were changed to the English language.

The big event of 1910 was on September 3rd when Colonel Teddy Roosevelt passed through Alton on a special train and was greeted by a crowd of more than 1,000 people who had gathered at the depot to see and hear him, and see his famous teeth. Wm. Kooreman handed Teddy a pair of small wooden shoes with the inscription, "We are all Dutch."

The maps inllustrate that the Braskamp emigrants were born in Apeldoorn, The Netherlands, and lived in Alton, Iowa. The arrows depict the dispersion over the United States. For the map of The Netherlands, 1 cm is approximately 65 km (40 miles). For the map of the USA 1 cm is about 530 km (330 miles). The surface of the States is 221 times that of the Netherlands. The population sizes are 15.2 and 253 million. This means that the average population density in The Netherlands is 133 times that in the US.

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Introduction first edition

1 December 1996

Near the end of the 19th century members of the Braskamp family emigrated from Apeldoorn, The Netherlands, to the United States of America. This booklet contains information about these people, their ancestors and their descendents.

Part of the information originates from a visit by John Lawrence Braskamp (born Alton, lowa, 1891) to Apeldoorn in 1933. He didn't find close relatives there, but he visited Marten Hermsen Brascamp -my grandfather's eldest brother- who happened to live in Apeldoorn, but who only was related to John Lawrence through their common ancestor Engelbert Brascamp, born in 1661. After that there was at least one letter from America in 1934. I will refer in this booklet to that letter several times.

Renewed contacts emerged when my brother Herm Jan worked at Princeton University, New Jersey, in the early seventies. He discovered a book by Larry Allan Braskamp, whose grandfather was a brother of John Lawrence. Over the years correspondence and mutual visits followed so the information on the Braskamp-family grew. Herm Jan also found a tribute to Bernard Braskamp, chaplain of the House of Representatives, Washington DC. This source led to correspondence with Bernard's daughter Anne Bernice Braskamp Tucker, whom I visited twice. Recently she sent me a book about Alton 1883-1983¹, with information about some 12 Braskamps. In this booklet I included a few pictures from the book.

This year a colleague of mine discovered an American telephone directory on the computer network World Wide Web, containing some 30 Braskamps. Later 6 more were found. Some 22 of them already had been included in the family tree. In the meantime I've contacted most of the others. Contacts were established with Janis Elaine Braskamp Smoak, Marcia Lethbridge Braskamp, Frederick Braskamp, Diane Braskamp D'Ambrogia, Marlene Braskamp Butz, and Bertha Lammers Braskamp and her husband Warren Braskamp.

These pages report the state of affairs, but the story is not complete at all as yet. I welcome corrections and supplemental information.

Brief history of the Brascamp families

The Brascamp families not only include individuals with the name Brascamp, but also with the names Braskamp and Klein Braskamp. There is a Braskamp branch originating from the Brascamp tree, including the American branch. There are also unrelated Dutch Braskamp trees. The Klein Braskamps (literally: klein = small) arose from one of the unrelated Braskamp trees. Most of the living members of these families are found in The Netherlands, but also considerable numbers in the USA and a few in New Zealand. There is a small, as it seems unrelated, Braskamp tree in Germany and also one in France. Currently I recognise 11 founders of the Brascamp families. Four founders have descendents today. Two of these four founders are not linked to the Dutch branches.

One of these two is the founder of the German family. In the times of Napoleon a French army was stationed at Lüneburg, near Hamburg, Germany. The first Braskamp of the German family (Georg Ferdinand) was born in 1812 out of a liaison of a French officer called Brascamp and a local girl. This officer may not have been French at all because Napoleons army no doubt had members of various nationalities. I currently have a hypothesis how the German branch actually decends from Engelbert Brascamp.

The second is Joséphine Braskamp, from Amsterdam, who had a son Louis Braskamp born in Brussels in 1811. The contacts with this tree are very young, so some additional research may lead to earlier ancestors.


The other founders were born in the east of The Netherlands, in "the Achterhoek", part of the province of Gelderland, mostly in Borculo and the neighbouring village of Geesteren. These founders were born between 1600 en 1650, and until now no family ties between them have been found.

Overview of the numbers of Brascamps, Braskamps and Klein Braskamps distributed over 14 generations and eleven founders. Four founders, Engelbert Brascamp (born around 1600), Henrick Braskamp (born around 1600), Georg Ferdinand Braskamp (born 1812) and Joséphine Braskamp (born about 1785) have descendents living today.

The current family tree includes 879 individuals (716 in 1996), distributed over 14 generations. I guess that presently some 230 persons from the various trees live around the world, including about 30 Brascamps in The Netherlands and New Zealand, some 60 Braskamps in the USA, 20 Braskamps from the Brascamp-tree in The Netherlands, a further 30 Braskamps and 60 Klein Braskamps in The Netherlands, about 10 Braskamps in Germany and 20 in France.

All currently living Brascamps, Braskamps and Klein Braskamps -apart from the German and French tree- trace back to two founders: Engelbert Brascamp from Borculo and Henrick Braskamp from Geesteren. The following overview summarises these two Dutch, plus the German and the French family trees. I recently linked the German Branch to be descendent from Engelbert Brascamp, but that needs to be confirmed.



Engelbert Brascamp was born around 1600, at Borculo. Very little is known about him. His grandson was baptised in Borculo in 1661, after his late grandfather Engelbert. Because he is ancestor of the American Braskamps, more of his family can be found in the next chapter.

Henrick Braskamp was born around 1600 as well, at Geesteren, on a farm probably named Braskamp. Today, a bit north of it a small house called "Braskamp" is located, in use as a holiday home. Nearly all descendents of Henrick have stayed in the east of the country, many of them farmers. One of Henrick's daughters lived at a farm called Veldsnijder or Klein Braskamp near the parental farm. Her grandchildren were called Klein Braskamp, after this farm. It is interesting to note that around 1750 Jan Oltwaeter, later called Klein Braskamp, and his wife Judith Scholten were farming at the Veldsnijder. Also their four daughters were called Klein Braskamp.



The Dutch ancestors

Generations 1 and 2

In 1661, on Dominica Sexagesima, the eighth Sunday before Easter, Wolter Brascamp had baptised his son and named Engelbert, after his deceased father. This message in the book of baptisms of the Dutch Reformed Church at Borculo is the most important piece of information about the start of this Brascamp tree. So the first Engelbert was born around 1600 and the member of the second generation, Wolter around 1625. The first Engelbert had two children baptised, in 1627 and 1633, and I assume that Wolter was an earlier child. The message of baptism of Engelbert in 1661 reads:



"Eadem Dm heft Wolter Brascamp een Ventjen doopen ende Engelbert nae sijn s Vader noemen laten. Ipsemet obtulit" which means: This same Sunday Wolter Brascamp had baptised a boy and had him named Engelbert after his late father. He carried him himself. This eighth Sunday before Easter actually was 17 February 1661, according to the Julian calendar.

Wolter Brascamp married in Borculo Tryntge te Reverhorst. In Borculo they had three children of whom Engelbert was the third in line. In 1665 Wolter and his family left Borculo for the town of Deventer, where they lived in the Smedenstraat. He and his wife became a member of the Reformed Church 29 September 1665 and 26 October 1665 Wolter, being a weaver, was registered as newly arrived citizen of Deventer. Not much later, Tryntge died and Wolter remarried 8 April 1667 to Aaltjen Hendricks with whom he had one son, born in 1668. Dated 19 August 1680 Wolter and Aaltjen had drafted a will, in which essentially the whole inheritance went to their only son, Engelbert. Apparently the other children died before that date. Wolter was a weaver and probably he and his family were rather well off because otherwise they wouldn't have had a will.

The name of Borculo¹ appears for the first time in a certificate of donation, through which Otto I of Germany donated various goods to the St Peters Monastry of Magdenburg among which the villa "Borglo" in Hameland. This certificate was dated 28 August 959. In the sixteenth century Borculo was lended by the bishop of Munster to various members of the Bronkhorst family. When Joost van Bronkhorst died without issue in 1553, the bishop took charge of the loan. Two counts of Limburg Stirum challenged this, however, and 20 December 1615 the court of Gelderland decided in favour of Joost van Limburg Stirum. The bishops of Munster didn't agree with this course. When in 1665 the Republic of the United Netherlands came into war with England, the bishop of Munster of that time, Berend van Galen, saw possibilities and promised England a second front with the necessary financial support by the English king Charles II. Charles declared war March 14, 1665 and Berend van Galen started 19 September. By 28 September Borculo was

occupied. With the peace treaty of Kleve -18 April 1666- the bishop of Munster had to restore the occupied areas to the Republic.

Comparing the dates of the campaign of Berend van Galen, with those of the arrival of Wolter Brascamp in Deventer one may conclude that he and his family may have fled for the approaching war.

Generation 3

Engelbert Brascamp, born in Borculo 17 February 1661 accompanied his parents on their move to the town of Deventer, on the east shore of the river JJssel. He married there 27-11-1681 Grietje Elsman, who was a daughter of Goessen Elsman of Neede and Aeltien ten Erve. Later on Engelbert became a sexton and schoolmaster in the village of Twello, close to Deventer across the IJssel. The Brascamps held this position for four generations until the second part of the 18th century. Engelbert and Grietje had seven children the youngest of which, Wolter, born in Twello 8-2-1694, was to be the ancestor of the Brascamps in The Netherlands and New Zealand. Engelbert died in Twello 29-1-1720.

The eldest child was Goossen, ancestor of the American Braskamps. Goossen's date of birth I have not found. There is, however, convincing evidence that Goossen is a child of Engelbert and Grietje.



The proof that Goossen is a son of Engelbert follows from an arrest in Wijhe related to the weighing of oak for which Goossen used illegal instruments. The arrest from 1707 is a very long story and the verdict is not known. The full text looks quite promising for Goossen, however, A small piece of the text reads: Waar op ter instantie van Gosen Brascamp, soon van Custos Engelbert Brascamp in Twello na voor gaande arrest en Gerigtelijke citatie onder Eede verhoort en geexamineert mogen worden Gerrit Van der Vegt en Steven Kruin. Which means: Where on behalf of Gosen Brascamp, son of sexton Engelbert Brascamp in Twello, after the earlier arrest and judicial citation can be heard and examined under oath Gerrit Van

der Vegt and Steven Kruin. The latter were the two gentlemen who sold and bought the oak which was weighted by Goossen Brascamp. They testified to be very happy with Goossen's work.

From the birth dates of the other 6 children the probable conclusion is that Goossen was the eldest child. Apparently Goossen was called after his maternal grandfather.

Goossen moved to Vaassen, a village north east of the town of Apeldoorn. His children were baptised there, and their family name was spelled as Braskamp, with k instead of c.

Dutch Ancestors

Generation 4

Goossen Brascamp married in December 1709 in Vaassen Geertruida Adriaanse, born in that village. Goossen died between 1712 and 1714, after which Geertruida remarried Hendrik van Wezel. This couple had 10 children.

Goossen and Geertruida had three children. The second, Willem Hendrik, was born in Vaassen 14-2-1712.

Generation 5

Willem Hendrik Braskamp lived in Vaassen and later on, certainly in 1756, on the estate "t Loo" (translated: the Forest). The palace 't Loo more than a century later was used by Queen Wilhelmina of The Netherlands. Willem married Thijsje Muller, who was a daughter of a paper manufacturer, possibly Christian Ludewich Muller. The couple had eight children, born in Vaassen and later Apeldoorn between 1736 and 1752. The fifth, Jan, born in Apeldoorn 16-3-1746, married and is responsible for four generations of Braskamps most of whom lived in Amsterdam. The seventh child, Gozewijn, was born in Apeldoorn 14-9-1749.

In The Netherlands the word "stad" (town, city) historically refers to a town having city rights. Examples are Amsterdam, Deventer and Leiden. In this sense Apeldoorn is not a city, but merely a large village. Apeldoorn grew near the estate and manor "Het Loo". When Prince Willem III of Orange (1650-1702) was named Stadtholder of Gelderland in 1672, he received the hunting rights to the provincial area called the Veluwe. Het Loo is in the middle of it. This sparsely populated area was extremely rich in wildlife: an Englishman of the time described it as one or the best hunting Countrys in ye World but good for Little else¹. Starting in the 16th century the Apeldoorn region was famous for its paper industry. The population over 10 years of age depended directly on the paper industry. The population started growing in the first half of the 19th century, In 1830 Apeldoorn had 7.200 inhabitants, in 1899 this number was 25.800². Currently, the number of inhabitants is 151.000.

Generation 6

Gozewijn was a butcher. He married Alyda Maria Westerhuis, from Bathmen, where they married in 1781. In Apeldoorn they received a certificate to marry in Bathmen dated 25-7-1781. The couple had 9 children. The sixth, Willem Hendrik was born Apeldoorn in 1789 and he was to be the ancestor of the Dutch Braskamp branch within the Brascamp tree. The American Braskamps descend from the second child, Johannes Hendrikus, born in Apeldoorn 7-6-1783.

Gozewijn died in Apeldoorn 12 January 1813 "in the age of about 63, living in the centre of Apeldoorn ('t dorp)". (The Dutch word 'dorp' means village).

Generation 7

Johannes Hendrikus Braskamp was a bailiff. He married Egberdina Johanna Berghorst, daughter of Berend Berghorst and Maria Wassink. Both parents died when their children were still very young. Their three children were born between 1808 and 1814, and Egberdina died 9-1-1815 and Johannes 8-3-1815, both in Apeldoorn. The second of the three children Bernardus Gozewijn was born in Apeldoorn 17-8-1811.

The local board in the early days mostly met in a tavern, for example "de Kar" [the Cart], "de Lelie" [the Lily] owned by the widow of Jan Arends, "het Hert" [the Deer] owned by the widow of Jan Rijkelds Everts Brink or with Goossen Brascamp at Apeldoorn and also sometimes at the house of chairman Krepel or of the secretary. Later on the place to meet again was the secretarie's office³.

This institution of the municipality was set up in the Napoleonic time. How Gozewijn Braskamp was involved in this is not clear. He may have had a tavern of some kind. Living in Apeldoorn, it is not logical to assume that he was a member of the municipality of Voorst. It is interesting to note that Gozewijn normally was called Goossen, like his grandfather. Also note that Brascamp here was written with a "c".

Generation 8

Bernardus Gozewijn Braskamp was a carpenter. He married in Apeldoorn 5-6-1840 Louise Landaal, born Apeldoorn 6-5-1818, daughter of Loog Landaal and Geertje Hendriks Disbergen. She died in Apeldoorn 7-2-1858.

Bernardus was registered for service in the national militia. By drawing of lots he got the number 120 and by certificate of the Governor of the Province of Gelderland at 2 May 1840 it was declared that this number not yet had been called for service and that therefore he had no obligation to enter service. At registration some information was noted about him. His length was "1 El and 679 strepen" (1 meter, 67.9 cm), his face circular, his forehead high, eyes blue, nose large, mouth large, chin round, hair blond, eyebrows blond, with no particular signs. Bernardus Gozewijn died in Apeldoorn 17-1-1877. The couple had 7 children, of whom 4 emigrated to the United States. These 7 children

were:

Louisa Egberdina and Louisa Geertruida died at a young age, on 9 September 1843 and 14 June 1855 respectively. As far as known, Gerrit Lodewijk stayed in The Netherlands. According to the registrar's office [In Dutch: Burgerlijke Stand] Gerrit Lodewijk left for Zutphen 13-11-1865. The other four children emigrated to the United States.

The emigrants

In The Netherlands the best available family sources before the Napoleontic period are registrations of births, marriages and funerals in church books, Currently these are kept centrally at the national archives in respective provinces. In Borculo these books start in 1616. Then, after the bishop of Munster left, all citizens became member of the Dutch Reformed Church. Starting in 1813 this kind of information can be found in the books of the registrar's office at the municipality hall. Also today, all births, marriages and deaths are registered at the registar's office. If people move to another municipality, this generally is registered. This kind of information is public some 50 years after registration because of privacy reasons. Currently the information is centrally available to about 1930 at the national archives in respective provinces. Also information of census records is available.

The emigrants

Generation 9

Johannes Hendrikus, Egberdina Louisa, Willem Laurens and Albertus Marinus emigrated to the United States. I did not succeed to trace records of arrival in America. However, Louisa Egberdina's and Albertus Marinus' dates of leaving for emigration are available at the registrar's office.

Johannes Hendrikus emigrated to the States with his wife and six children after 1882, because his youngest child was born in Amsterdam.

Louisa Egberdina married in Apeldoorn Peter Gores Ketel, a miller. Two children were born in Apeldoorn in 1870 and 1872, and four in Wisconsin. The eldest child died when one month old, and the couple emigrated with their second child 22-3-1872.

Willem Laurens married 15-11-1879, presumably in Sioux Centre where there eldest child was born in 1880. In The Netherlands Willem Laurens was a carpenter, travelling from Apeldoorn to various other places where he lived for a couple of years, probably for different jobs. The last date known is 17-7-1871 when according to the registrar's office he moved from Apeldoorn to Arnhem. Albertus Marinus was a copper smith's man and his departure for the United States is registered as 10-3-1877, from Wageningen where he was living since 1874. Albertus Marinus married 1879 in Orange City, Iowa.

From this information it seems that Louisa Egberdina and Peter Gores Ketel were the first to emigrate to the States, in 1872. Willem Laurens and Albertus Marinus emigrated later on, perhaps together in 1877, both still unmarried. Johannes Hendrikus was the last to emigrate, with wife and children, after 1882. I found no records about reasons of emigration. It doesn't seem that there were religious reasons behind it. My guess is that there was an economic motive, the expectation that the United States would offer great opportunities. For Willem Laurens and Albertus Marinus the death of their father, in January 1877, may well have triggered their emigration after their sister Louisa.

Born in Apeldoorn 28-1-1841. He went to school in Apeldoorn. Moved to Enschede 17-7-1862, returned to Apeldoorn 24-10-1863 and moved to Enschede once more 24-6-1866. He married in Amsterdam 25-5-1870 Maria Elisabeth (Mietje) Gillise, born The Hague 29-12-1841, died Alton 27-3-1923, daughter of Simon Gillise, carpenter, and Elisabeth de Klerk. In 1881 they lived at Daniël Stalpertstraat 44. Amsterdam, as a building contractor. Their youngest child was born in Amsterdam, in 1882, so the couple emigrated with their children to the States after that year. To keep track of all individuals in the family trees I have developed a numbering system in which the first Engelbert is given a "1" and his son and first child Wolter a "11". Wolter's son and third child Engelbert a "113" and so on. Following this system, Bernardus Gozewijn, father of the emigrating Braskamps has number 11312722. According to the number Bernardus is a 8th generation descendant of the first founder, Engelbert. Myself, I have number 11375452322. The number indicates that I am a descendant of the same founder, that I am of 11th generation and that Bernardus Gozewijn and myself have 113, i.e. Engelbert Brascamp, as a common ancestor.

For the purpose of this booklet from generation 9 onwards I ignore the "11312722", because that part is identical for the emigrants and their descendants.



Remarks by Representative Charles B. Hoeven

OF IOWA

FEBRUARY 1, 1950

Mr. Speaker, I am highly pleased over the appointment of Rev. Bernard Braskamp, D. D., as Chaplain of the House of Representatives, to succeed retiring Rev. James Shera Montgomery, D. D. My home town of Alton, Iowa, is greatly honored to have one of its native sons selected for this distinguished position, for this little town of Alton, where I reside, is the place where Dr. Braskamp was born and grew to manhood

Another lifelong friend of Dr. Braskamp and one who takes particular pleasure in his election as Chaplain is Claude S. Scheckel, one of the Official Reporters of Debates in the House of Representatives. Dr. Braskamp, Mr. Scheckel, and I have known each other since childhood, all three being from Alton. It is a remarkable coincidence that the three of us meet again here in the great forum of the House of Representatives.

Dr. Braskamp, who has spent his entire ministry of 39 years in Washington, is the dean among the 42 pastors of the Washington City Presbytery in length of service. It is stated that among the several hundred clergy in Washington of the Protestant, Catholic, and Hebrew faiths there is only one in the active pastorate who exceeds him in the record of length of service. In 1951, when he completes his 40 years in his Washington pastorate, he plans to write a book entitled "Forty Years a Minister in the Nation's Capital."

The Gurley Memorial Presbyterian Church, which was his first church after being associated with Dr. Charles Wood in the Church of the Covenant, is in fact still his one and only church. It was named in memory of Dr. Phineas D. Gurley, Chaplain of the United States Senate and pastor of the historic New York Avenue Presbyterian Church where President Abraham Lincoln worshipped. Dr. Braskamp was the leader when the Gurley congregation built a new house of worship, and 7 years later he became the leader in merging the Gurley and Gunton-Temple Congregations and in the erection of their present church at Sixteenth and Newton Streets.

During the past 10 years he has officiated more than 175 times as Acting Chaplain in the House, substituting for Dr. Montgomery. During these past 10 years he has also been the Acting Chaplain in the Senate on more

than 75 occasions and during the entire 1948 Special Session of the Congress and the vacation periods of Chaplain Dr. Frederick Brown Harris and the late Chaplain, Dr. Peter Marshall.

Dr. Braskamp pursued his education and received degrees from the following schools: Public school in Alton, Iowa; graduated from the Northwestern Classical Academy at Orange City, Iowa, in 1903; first 2 years of college study at Grinnell, Iowa; graduated from the University of Michigan with the degree of bachelor of arts in 1908; first year of theological training in Hartford, Conn.; last 2 years of theological training in Princeton Seminary, graduating in 1911; received the degree of master of arts from Princeton University in 1911, having taken his studies in the department of philosophy. In June 1930 Hanover College of Hanover, Ind., gave him the honorary degree of doctor of divinity.

In June 1947 he was made a Knight of the Order of Orange Nassau, the decoration being bestowed on him by Queen Wilhelmina at a ceremony conducted by Ambassador Loudon in the Netherlands Embassy.

In 1929 he was elected to the office of moderator of the Washington City Presbytery which is composed of 42 churches and in 1940 he was made the moderator of the Synod of Baltimore which is composed of the 153 Presbyterian Churches of Washington City, Baltimore, and New Castle.

Dr. Braskamp has for 15 years been the president of the Princeton Theological Seminary Alumni Association of Washington and is a member of the Washington Princeton University Club, and the University of Michigan.

In September 1925 he married Anna C. Bull, of Milford, Pa. They have two children, a daughter, Anne Bernice, age 22, who graduated from Wilson College, Chambersburg, Pa., with a bachelor of arts degree in June 1949, and entered the law department of George Washington University in September 1949. Bernard, Jr., age 18, graduated from Calvin Coolidge High School in June 1949 and is preparing to enter West Point Military Academy in 1950.

Dr. Braskamp was born of humble, God-fearing Dutch parents in Alton, Iowa, a small town of 1,000 inhabitants in the northwestern part of the State where the temperature one winter, during his boyhood days, registered 42° below zero although on the 18th day of February 1887, when he was born, it was only 15 below.

His father and mother were childhood friends and schoolmates in Holland, both having been born in Appeldorn, where the Queen has her summer home. His mother was 15 years of age when her parents and their nine children emigrated to America. His father, who was the same age, was a young tinsmith in Appeldorn and when he reached the age of 21 and had earned enough money at his trade to pay for his passage, he also went west to America, the "land of opportunity," where his boyhood sweetheart was living. A few years after his arrival they were married, the bride having been employed as a seamstress and the bridegroom having found work as a tinsmith and clerk in the small hardware store in Alton. TRIBUTE

Dr. Braskamp speaks the Dutch language fluently and keeps his command of that language by reading his mother's Bible which she brought with her from Holland. He often calls to mind those pioneer days in the prairies of Iowa when life was a tremendous struggle and there were many hardships.

The house in which he was born was a small frame building with no heat in any room except in the kitchen where there was a cook stove in which corn cobs, purchased from farmers at 75 cents per wagonload, were the only fuel material. He and the other four children in the family slept on straw beds in rooms without heat. The mother, after kneeling with them in prayer, would tuck them in, the last in bed having the great thrill of blowing out the lamp which she carried.

Dr. Braskamp's parents made every possible sacrifice to give their five children a college education. After completing his grammar-school studies in Alton, he went to the Northwestern Classical Academy at Orange City, Iowa, which was 4 miles to the northwest. He usually walked this distance, leaving home at 6:45 in the morning, the starting time being determined by the weather. It was pretty tough going to face the cold northwest wind in the winter months. Like every normal boy he often wished that he could hear the news that the academy had burned to the ground and that there would not be any school.

On the evening of the academy commencement exercises the principal, in his introductory remarks, announced that the 16-year-old Braskamp boy in knee-length pants who was the next on the program to give an oration, had never during his 3 years been late for the 8 o'clock chapel services. Dr. Braskamp gives his mother all the credit for that record for she got up every morning at 5:30 to start the cook-stove fire and to melt enough water in the ice-covered basin so that he could wash his face and hands before sitting down to his breakfast which usually consisted of a large dish of oatmeal, toast, and a cup of hot chocolate. His mother would always put a few home-made cookies or doughnuts in his overcoat pocket which would tide him over until he returned from school at about 1:30 in the afternoon after walking the 4 miles.

After graduating from the academy he went to Grinnell College, Iowa, entering at the age of 16. In his freshman and sophomore years he was the short-stop on the varsity baseball team and the pitcher on his class team. There is one intercollege game whose memory haunts him. Grinnell was playing the University of Iowa and the game was a tie at the beginning of the ninth inning with Iowa University at bat. There was an Iowa runner on third base and two outs. The batter on the third pitch drove a sizzling grounder to the shortstop which he handled cleanly just as he had done with the seven other grounders but something happened and he threw the ball about 20 feet over the first baseman's head and into the grandstand. The game was over for Grinnell failed to score during the last half of the ninth inning. A heart-broken player went home in tears.

Dr. Braskamp completed his first 2 years at Grinnell College in a creditable manner but his parents were financially unable to assist him in continuing his studies. There was very little opportunity for a student to work his way through school at Grinnell. He consequently found it necessary to stay home and spent the year as a clerk in his father's hardware store. It was his job to open the store every morning at 7 o'clock, start the fire in the stove, sweep the floor, and dust the counter. After those chores he was ready to do a rushing business. The hardware business, however, was not a lucrative one, especially during the cold winter months. Frequently, when his father and he were getting ready to close the store at 9 o'clock in the evening, they would find, upon counting the money in the till, that they had sold less than \$2 worth of merchandise.

Dr. Braskamp's parents, always ready to make every sacrifice for their children's education, sold their last small tract of farm land, which they had purchased for \$8 an acre, in order that he might be privileged to pursue his education. He decided to go to the University of Michigan for those last 2 years. Realizing what tremendous sacrifices his parents were making, he immediately upon arriving at Ann Arbor, Mich., started out in search of work which would help pay expenses. He found work waiting on tables and cutting the lawn of one of the professors. In the wintertime he took care of the professor's furnace. He did not have time, however, for the practice and training that was required of a student who was trying out for the varsity baseball team and therefore gave up his boyhood dream of being a major-league player.

One week in the spring he made big money. He was given charge of the sale of the librettos for the May festival. He made \$32 that week but his duties, as sales manager, deprived him of the inspiration and pleasure of hearing Schumann-Heink who was on the program that year. It was a question of business before pleasure.

In the summertime, during his vacations, he sold maps and the Century Book of Facts. He also made an extra few dollars at the Fourth of July celebration in his home town and the nearby towns for he was quite a sprinter, usually winning first or second place in the 100-yard dash. The men who bet on him would always give him at least 50 cents or a dollar whenever he was the first to hit the tape.

Having been a shortstop on a college baseball team he also frequently made a few dollars by playing for neighboring towns.

At the beginning of his senior year at the University of Michigan he decided to enter the law department after receiving his bachelor of arts degree but a few months before graduation he felt the urge to enter the ministry. Then in September he went to Hartford Theological Seminary, Hartford, Conn., where he was given a scholarship.

While a first-year student in the Hartford Seminary he had the great privilege of hearing an address by Woodrow Wilson, president of Princeton University. He was so inspired by that message that he decided to go to TRIBUTE

Princeton for the remaining 2 years of seminary training where he could have an opportunity to hear Woodrow Wilson more frequently. It became his great ambition to obtain a master of arts degree from Princeton University. Consequently the following year he went from Hartford to Princeton. In addition to taking the regular studies in the theological seminary he went over to the university to enroll in the graduate department. At the end of the 2 years he not only graduated from the theological seminary but received the degree of master of arts in philosophy from Princeton

He was licensed and ordained to the ministry by the presbytery of Brooklyn, N. Y., in May 1911. In September 1911, he was invited to Washington to become the assistant pastor of the Church of the Covenant, now called the National Presbyterian Church, where Dr. Charles Wood was then the revered pastor.

On the screen of a video display praising the "clean" war, photos depicting the real pain of war were placed, covering the image. Blood was thrown across the display and leaflets with little known factual information about the war were distributed to museum visitors nearby. Statements were made regarding the perversion of the Beautitudes while participants knelt in repentance. Anne Tucker

was arrested for blood pouring, and eight others were arrested more or less random for a variety of minor offenses. All but Tucker were released later that day, charged with being a public nuisance. Tucker was held overnight and charged with destruction of property. All were ordered to appear in court on October 16". Ultimately the case was postponed.
